In recent weeks we received a letter indicating that we will have to vacant the premises by June 2007.

Hazel house will remain as it is, but all of us living at the Greenacres premises will have to find a new place we can call home. To move an entire and well established community with so little notice is very unreal and almost impossible, so we hope that at least we can agree on a more humane time frame to work with. Nevertheless, the future will bring many new challenges and we will face them in true community spirit.
