# Notes about choosing the wedding music that's right for you:

I am delighted that I might be a part of your own special day. I am here to help you choose the music that will complement your wedding ceremony and is *right for you*.

I have been singing at weddings for over 15 years, and have been a professional church singer for over a decade (as a choir member, soloist and trained cantor).

Some couples know what music they would like; some need more help. I'm happy to meet you, bring you through the music and help you make your choice.

To choose music that is both personal and special, please consider these questions:

- 1. How much music do you want?
- 2. What style of music classical, contemporary, Celtic or traditional? I advise a mixture of different styles and mention examples of each in this document
- 3. Do you want to convey a particular message or mood during the wedding?
- 4. Is there anything you've heard in the past, that you would really like?
- 5. Have I mentioned it? If not, let me know (I have not listed everything here)
- 6. Have you chosen your readings and prayers yet? If so, we can link with them

This document includes just a sample selection of music which has proved popular with couples over the years. A lot of the music mentioned can be sung at different parts of the wedding ceremony and there is a lot more music available on request.

If you are having a Wedding Blessing, please contact me for a more suitable repertoire, for some of these pieces are linked directly to a Eucharist celebration.

Not all music is suitable for a church wedding; I can guide you about this. However, I advise all couples to let their priest/celebrant know what music has been chosen.

If you are using the organist from your church, we will need to let them know what music you're considering to ensure that they are comfortable playing it. Organists are a good source of information on approved music in their church, as well as the conventions about whether or not the acclamations are usually spoken, or sung.

Remember that should you require other music, the services of an organist, another musician or even a choir for your special day, I can arrange this at your request.

## Sign of peace

### Signing of the register (if not solo organ, or silent)

As this is not part of the church ceremony, music does not *have* to be liturgical (for example an operatic aria can be sung). However, it is important to check your choice with your priest/celebrant. In addition to music already mentioned, popular choices include:

Blessed are all they that fear the Lord (Wedding Anthem)	Handel
Et exultavit; Quia respexit or Quia fecit from Magnificat	Bach
Evergreen	Streisand
Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring	Bach
If a picture paints a thousand words	Gates
I know my redeemer liveth (Messiah)	Handel
In a country churchyard	Denver
I watch the sunrise (Close to you)	Murphy
May the Father's boundless Love (Wedding Cantata no. 202)	Bach
How Beautiful are the feet / O, Come onto him (Messiah)	Handel
Sheep may safely grace (Cantata 208)	Bach

### Other areas where music is sometimes included in the ceremony:

**Acclamations** (various composers & languages): Kyrie, Sanctus and Agnus Dei (i.e. Lord have mercy, Holy Holy & Lamb of God) Gospel Acclamation (Alleluia, then text linked to Gospel reading or Love) Memorial Acclamation (i.e. He is Lord)

**Interlude after wedding vows** (usually organ, when included) Sung examples include the Mozart "Alleluja" or Beethovan's "Ode to Joy"
